228th day of the war


- One of the way to define a state when people are ready to die for it
- Ukraine exists, the question is does Russia exist in this sense?
- Crimea bridge damaged: the best protected from air, land and under the water
- Ukrainians are joking: Putin's birthday present, "Happy birthday, mr. President"





- February 24, 2022
 - Full scale military invasion by Russia's army (allegedly #2 in the world
 - With absurdly false narrative as justification that Ukraine does not exist and must be de-nazified
 - Converting to Christianity over a thousand years ago, when neither Russia or Ukraine existed.
 - Democracy vs. authoritarian
 - Fighting for the right to exist, for survival
 - Symbolizes the world struggle





Goal of any war – eliminate the enemy



1. Information Influence

2. Moral Disarmament

3. Physical Neutralization



- Ukraine vs. Russia: known entity vs. ?
- Used to be not seen, confused with Russia
- Outsiders not sure about the borders
- Jewish president
 - Interesting fact: First settlers on the territory what is now Ukraine were Greeks and Tatars in the south
 - Later the two main groups emerge -- Ukrainians and Jews
 - Ethnicities with strong identities but unclear geographical borders

Memoricide – killing of memory. History repeating...

- Massive grain theft threat of hunger, new Holodomor in Southern and Eastern Ukraine (Kherson, Melitopol, Berdiansk...)
- Filtration camps humiliating human rights (imprisoning/kidnapping people for their pro-Ukrainian position)
- Destroying cultural objects:
 - Skovoroda museum (Kharkiv oblast)
 - Taras Shevchenko monument (Borodyanka, Kyiv oblast)
 - Sviatohirsk Lavra (Donetsk oblast)
- Burning history books (Melitopol, Zaporizhzhia oblast)

Putin's nostalgia for the Soviet Union

- Suppressing the truth
- KGB rules
- Underlying belief that truth exists and must be hidden
- Dissidents, political prisoners
- KGB tactics prevail
- Using western technologies and manipulating democratic principles
- More information does not mean equality, does not mean everybody are united
- Polarization of the world
- Number of victories for Putin



- The plurality does not lead to better debate and democracy
- The best information does not float to the top
- Holding the truth to the powerful
 - Fact checking lying politicians: does not work universally
 - Naive thinking that having evidence will make people believe what is true
 - People choose what fits their biases
 - Theory of rational choices does not work
 - People self-select their own reality: what fits their cultural identity
 - Having lots of sources DOES NOT lead to better understanding between people

Short History of Russia's Information Warfare in 21st century

- Russia's unparalleled web of special operation
 - Upheaving Europe,
 - Britain, Spain, France, Italy
 - by funding clandestine campaigns of ultra-right nationalist movements
 - Many stories of success
- And yet poorly built military "special operation" in Ukraine
- Poorly understood Ukrainians
- Hoped that Kyiv would fall in 3 days
- Arrived with uniforms ready for the triumphant parades

- The fact that Kyiv did not fall was a surprise for many military experts, except historians who know Ukrainian history
- History of struggle for independence
 - Breaking free from serfdom (kosaks)
 - From the empire
- Independence is a process
- The last 30 years after the collapse is just another iteration
 - People feel truly independent after 2014
 - The war strengthened the Ukrainian identity

- Russian propaganda: Ukrainian population is targeted by various sources of propaganda
- Propaganda from Russian agents in Ukraine
- Ordinary people coming together,
 - strong horizontal web of networks
 - and everyone has their place in the war effort: from farmers to grannies
 - Before the war: Entrepreneurial society of individuals,
 - The government structures
 - Were not integrated with the civil society
 - Russia does not have this element in their society









- First stages of the war for people's minds
 - Excessively important
- Ukrainians are united:
 - united through hardships, resilience and tolerance
- We are united when we come under attack
 - Can rely on our neighbors to get through
 - Very strong horizontal network of people
- Open mind
 - Acceptance of others and their differences
- Ability to negotiate differences and unifying in a face of danger is an archetypal Ukrainian character

- United the world
- United bipartisan support in the United States
- Farmer in Wyoming can relate to a farmer in Ukraine
- Nation of do-ers
- Independent individual spirit









What about Ukrainian media vocabulary?

Politics of time



- Politics of inevitability
 - 90s, policies for the future, progressive era, climate change is acknowledged and policies for the future are made
- Politics of eternity
 - MAGA period, focusing on the great past, as the age of greatness and "real Americans" being in charge, trying to revers climate change policies, no policies for the future
- Politics of catastrophe
 - There is no future, nothing matters, military conf
- Russia is ahead of the world
 - But the world does not have to follow
- Climate change
 - If the West would switch to alternative energy earlier
 - Carbon Emperor would not have risen



Conclusions

- More than ever before, counter messaging is about listening rather than talking
- Understanding local needs and motivations
 - Particular media environments and social networks—holds the key to success.
 - Audiences are more fractured than ever
 - but up-to-date sociology and big-data analysis also allow us to understand more about audiences than ever. Simply "blasting" single messages at audiences is naive and could well be counterproductive.
- RT, Sputnik are banned
 - In many European countries
 - IN Ukraine was turned off in 2014 through the courts
- Information Literacy on a large scale
